A Message from Jeff **No Soliciting Ordinance**

This past year, at my urging, the Board of Commissioners passed a “no soliciting ordinance” to help protect the residents of Haverford Township. We created a “do not call” list, which is given to people who apply for a soliciting permit. You can sign up on the list at the township web site www.haverfordtownship.org or by calling the Codes Department. If an address is on the list, solicitors can’t knock on that door. Additionally, if people have a “do not solicit” sign on their door...no solicitors can call on that house. Certain religious, political, social groups are exempt from the “do not solicit” sign. My recommendation, which is also in the ordinance, is to have a “no trespassing” sign, which means, plain and simple, stay away! If someone still calls against the “do not call” list, the “no solicitation” sign or the “no trespassing” sign residents should call the police and the matter will be addressed accordingly.

Under Construction

The following projects have been proposed, are approved, or are under construction in Haverford Township

The Board of Commissioners is considering the adoption of a proposed Historic Preservation ordinance that is designed to help prevent the demolition of the township’s historic resources. The ordinance is presently under consideration at public meetings of the Board.

The Recreation Department recently opened fields for use at Haverford Reserve and plans to open additional fields in the Spring. An architect was hired to prepare schematic drawings of the indoor recreation and environmental center at the site.

At Haverford Reserve (former state hospital) – the second condominium building is under construction, adding 33 new condominium units. Many of the 33 units in the first building have been sold. Two new carriage homes are also under construction and all 100 units are expected to be completely built over the next 3-5 years.

The Haverford Township School District is razing the old Manoa Elementary School and constructing a soccer field in its place.

The flash-flooding from the August 2nd storm washed out the stone bridge abutment on West Hathaway Lane, damaging utilities, undermining the road and causing the closure of the 24’ wide, 16’ long bridge. The Township has been working with its engineers and representatives of the PA DEP approve a design for the needed repairs. The engineers estimated that repairs will cost about \$435,000 and will result in the continued closure of the road for approximately 4-6 months.

Flu Shots

The Health Dept. will sponsor Influenza Immunization Clinics on October 19 & 26, from 9 AM to noon at the Quatrani Building of the Twp. Administration complex, 2325 Darby Road. Residents must meet at least one of the following criteria: 65 years of age or older; chronic medical, including pulmonary or cardiovascular, conditions; adults providing home care to chronically ill persons or who have a high risk household member and women who will be pregnant during the Influenza season. You are not eligible if you are under 18; allergic to eggs, Thimerosal, Gentamicin or prior influenza vaccines; if you have a systemic latex allergy; Guillain-Barre Syndrome; or if you are ill with a fever at the time of your appointment. We will receive the vaccine from the University of Pennsylvania Hospital and their registered nurses will administer the vaccine. Call 610.446.1000, ext. 202 to schedule an appointment.

A Note from the Township Manager



In the past eight months since Haverford Township implemented single-stream recycling, the annual cost to dispose of trash has dropped by \$110,000 while the rate at which residents recycle household items has soared to more than 70%.

The convenience afforded residents by disposing of all recyclable materials in one container has both heightened residents' participation and environmental awareness.

We're eliminating separate pickups of glass, plastic, aluminum, and paper, saving fuel costs. Reducing the amount of waste sent to the incinerators saves tonnage fees.

Residents appreciate the reduced number of pickups and the ease of participation.

In addition to our recycling initiatives, Haverford Township Public Works Department is preparing for the upcoming leaf collection season. I have previously reported that both Haverford and Marple Townships are one step closer to implementing a consolidated composting program that will benefit the residents of both communities. We received delivery of a new composting machine that will allow Haverford and Marple Townships to compost leaves and reduce leaf collections for Haverford Township by over \$100,000 per year, and create free mulch for our gardens. I am extremely excited about the many benefits this new program will create.

We have begun working on the proposed 2010 operating budget which will include capital programs and a three year prospective budget that will be presented to the Board of Commissioners by October 30, 2009.

Flu Vaccine – 2010

What exactly is influenza?

1. Influenza (the flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It can cause mild or severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The strains of influenza virus change every year as the viruses circulate around the world infecting people and some animal hosts. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccination each year. In the United States, an average 5% to 20% of the population get infected by seasonal influenza every year; more than 200,000 people are hospitalized from flu complications, and about 36,000 people die from flu-related causes. Some groups, such as older people, young children, and people with certain health conditions, are at high risk for serious flu complications.

2. This year, there is a new influenza virus called H1N1 (also known as swine flu) which can cause infections in addition to the usual seasonal influenza viruses.

I heard there will be 3 vaccines. What are they and why will I need to receive them?

There will be at least 2 flu vaccines this year because of the new H1N1 influenza virus (aka swine flu), which can cause infections in addition to the usual seasonal influenza viruses.

1. The usual seasonal influenza vaccine will be available by September/October. It is given as a single injection in the upper arm. It is recommended for

- Children 6 months to 18 years of age
- Adults older than 50
- Pregnant women
- Anyone with chronic medical problems that raise their risk of complications from influenza. These problems include asthma, diabetes, heart disease and immune-compromise.

e. Healthcare workers

2. There will be a new vaccine for the H1N1 virus. The H1N1 vaccine will be available later in the fall. It is recommended for

- Young people aged 6 months to 24 years of age
- People who live with infants younger than 6 months of age
- People between 25 and 64 years of age with chronic medical problems that raise their risk of complications from influenza. These problems include asthma, diabetes, heart disease and immune-compromise.
- Pregnant women
- Healthcare workers
- People who live in nursing homes or long-term care facilities

Are the vaccines for the H1N1 (aka swine flu) safe?

The vaccine for H1N1 (aka swine flu) is being manufactured in the same way that seasonal vaccine is made, and we know that the seasonal vaccine is safe. The vaccine for H1N1 (aka swine flu) is being tested clinically now in the United States. We do not expect new safety concerns, but if they arise during clinical testing, the CDC will publicize them.

Can I get influenza from the seasonal or H1N1 influenza vaccines?

No. There is no virus in the injectible vaccine.

I may be pregnant, is the vaccine safe for me?

Yes. The vaccine is strongly recommended for pregnant women because they are at greater risk for serious illness from seasonal and H1N1 (aka swine flu) influenza infections.

Do I have to wait in-between each vaccine or can I receive them all at once?

It will probably be fine to give seasonal and H1N1 vaccine at the same time, but

- Since the seasonal vaccine will be available sooner, we plan to give it first - beginning as soon as the vaccine arrives in early fall as usual.
- The H1N1 vaccines will probably require two shots given 3-4 weeks apart. The timing will depend on vaccine availability, probably beginning in mid to late October.

I have heard that some people have a negative reaction to flu vaccines. What is the possibility that I may have a reaction, what are the symptoms and what do I do if these symptoms occur?

1. Serious negative reactions to flu vaccines are very rare, but medications and vaccines can cause allergic reactions. People who know they are allergic to any part of influenza vaccine or to eggs should not get the seasonal or H1N1 influenza vaccine. In addition, people who have had a rare neurologic disease called Guillain-Barre Syndrome (aka GBS) should not get the vaccine unless their own doctor recommends it.

2. Some signs of a serious reaction include fever, difficulty breathing, hoarseness or wheezing, facial or throat swelling, hives, muscle weakness, fainting or near-fainting, severe pain, itching beyond the injection site, or rash that goes beyond the injection site. Anyone who develops any of these problems after any vaccine or medication should have immediate medical evaluation.

3. Mild symptoms after influenza vaccination such as localized soreness or redness do not need to be treated.

4. If you are ever severely ill after any medication, you should go to your own doctor or the nearest ED.

I already was diagnosed with the virus do I still need to get the vaccine?

At this time, vaccination is still recommended for people who have already had influenza this year. This recommendation could change if further information on immunity becomes available.

What is the medical efficacy?

1. Seasonal influenza virus strains change frequently in contrast to other vaccine-preventable illnesses like measles and Hepatitis B. The effectiveness of influenza vaccination depends on how closely the vaccine matches circulating strains of virus. Every year, the World Health Organization identifies the three seasonal influenza strains most likely to cause illness around the world, and pharmaceutical companies produce vaccine to match. If the match remains accurate during the months it takes to make the vaccine, the vaccine has maximum medical efficacy in preventing influenza illness and transmission.

2. The new H1N1 vaccine is being made to match the new H1N1 influenza virus. It is being tested now for safety and efficacy.

What are the possible side effects of the immunization?

Most people have no side effects from immunization except mild soreness at the injection site. You cannot get influenza from the vaccine because there is no "live" infectious virus in the solution. Serious side-effects are rare, but can include allergic reactions. If you develop allergic symptoms after any vaccine or medication, you should be medically evaluated immediately. Serious allergic symptoms can include any of the following: fever, difficulty breathing, hoarseness or wheezing, facial or throat swelling, hives, muscle weakness, fainting or near-fainting, severe pain, itching beyond the injection site, or rash that goes beyond the injection site. Of course, if you have other serious symptoms after any vaccination or medication, you should also seek medical care.

Who is most at risk for the flu?

In general, children, the elderly, pregnant women, and people with medical conditions that affect their immune systems, lungs, and hearts are at greatest risk of influenza disease and influenza complications. There are some differences between the seasonal and H1N1 influenza viruses in terms of risk groups, with children and young adults at relatively greater risk for H1N1 complications. Obesity may also increase the risk of H1N1 complications. You reduce the risk of influenza for your family by being vaccinated.

Is there a flu vaccine that doesn't require a shot?

Yes, there is an inhalational seasonal flu vaccine called FluMist which is given nasally. It is very effective in preventing influenza. However, unlike the injected vaccine, FluMist does contain a weakened form of seasonal influenza virus. Therefore, some people who receive it may have several days of mild upper respiratory symptoms, usually including a runny nose. FluMist is only approved for healthy non-pregnant adults under the age of 50. You should talk to your own doctor if you are interested in this vaccine.
